Board Chair, Steve Reed, called the meeting to order at 11:07a.m.

Public Session

Steve Tyrell began a conversation regarding the future of the NCCC pool. He commented on the master plan for the Saranac Lake Campus and the ideas of how to use the space differently if the College chooses to go in that avenue. JMZ has hired an aquatics consultant to review the pool and offer additional information. JMZ has two proposals in work (one with and one without the pool). Several members of the community showed support in keeping the pool active. They commented on the importance of the pool to not only the College but to the members of community.

Approval of Minutes

Pete Suttmeier made a motion to approve the November 30, 2018 minutes. Mark Moller seconded the motion. The November 30, 2018 minutes were approved unanimously (6-0-0).

College Senate

Steve Tyrell spoke on behalf of Sarah Kilby. Senate recommends the College begin a search for a vice president for marketing and enrollment immediately. If possible, the new president should interview the finalist. Steve Tyrell concurred with the Senate's recommendation and a search will commence at this time.

Vice President for Academic Affairs

Joe Keegan reported:

- Team is preparing for the next anticipated Middle States visit in Fall 2019.
 - O Steve Tyrell directed members of the board to review their packet portion which includes current mission. He commented on the importance of re-writing the College's Mission, Visions Values. Reaffirming accreditation, inclusivity, continuous improvement, curriculum review process is data driven. He respectfully requested the board to review and share perspective.

- Update on Second Chance Pell we received a request to submit a budget for 19-20 which is a hopeful sign. That budget is under development and due mid-February.
- SUNY Workforce Development Grant we have been working with workforce partners in Essex and Franklin Counties to gauge interest in participating in the SUNY Workforce Development Grant. The grant, which can be as much as \$50,000 per college, is provided to interested community colleges to work with, administer and, where possible, deliver needed training for area employers.
- Academic Programming Update:
 - o AAS Chem Dep Counseling program was recertified by NYS Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS) to deliver 350-hour education and training to prepare student to become Credentialed Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Counselor trainees.
 - o AEMT materials are being finalized and will be headed to NYSED shortly.
 - o Nursing Self-study which includes a visit from NYSED to recertify the programs is fully underway.

Interim Vice President for Enrollment Management Report

Alex Parnia introduced himself to the members of the Board of Trustees.

- Alex shared his report.
- Alex presented a report regarding current trends in enrollment and the future of NCCC, the importance of increasing our yield rates and the need for the College to focus on recruiting non-traditional students; in particular, the College needs to revise how it chooses to provide classes that accommodate to the needs of this growing prospective student population.
- * Mary Irene Lee joined the meeting.

Vice President for Administration/CFO:

Bob Farmer highlighted the November 2018 and December 2018 financials.

- o For 2018-19, overall FTE's are projected to be down 40 for the year vs. 30 at our last meeting. This translates to \$350,000 revenue shortfall.
- O NCCC is fortunate to be in a position to have a fund balance to absorb the deficit. Managers are doing what they can to minimize expenses for current year and work is being done on the 19-20 budget. Some items that can close the gap next year could be additional sports teams and new programs.
- o Investments are earning about 3% and NCCC should earn between \$40,000 \$50,000 this year vs a budget of \$25,000.
- o There was a brief discussion about the status of Second Chance Pell for next year.

Pete Suttmeier moved to approve the financials as they were presented. Mary Irene Lee seconded. November & December 2018 financial reports were approved unanimously (6-0-0).

President's Report:

Steve Tyrell reported:

- o JMZ will share their final report on the proposed school of applied technology soon.
- SLK Master Plan final draft presentation, with estimates, will be presented Monday, February 25th.
 Steve Tyrell recommended moving the board meeting from the February 22nd to Monday, February, 25th.
 - o Mark Moeller moved to approve the new date for the February Board of Trustees meeting to the 25th; to coincide with the Master Plan presentation from JMZ. Pete Suttmeier seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously (6-0-0).

NCCC Association:

NCCC Foundation:

Dianna Fortune reported:

- o Alumni Reception will be on February 9th from 10am to Noon at The Hotel Saranac.
- o The Bobby Bernstein scholarship is close to being a fully endowed scholarship fund. Currently an anonymous donor has offered matching dollars until February 19th.

Old Business:

o Steve Tyrell recommended to the board the Senior Enrollment Management Officer position be titled Vice President of Marketing and Enrollment Management. The board concurred.

New business

- o Steve Tyrell reported SUNY Canton/SUNY Potsdam discussion and negotiations continue. If negotiations go well, a Service Area Agreement will be prepared and distributed for parties to review in the next 2-3 weeks.
- o On February 12th at 12:30pm, there will be an open forum regarding the College's Mission/Vision and Institutional priorities.

The board recommended the following recommendations:

Steve Reed recommended resolution 2018/19 | 5 that the North Country Community College Board of Trustees hereby approves that in conjunction with and subject to the consent and approvals of the Board of Trustees of the State University of the State of New York, the Franklin County Board of Legislators and the Essex County Board of Supervisors, the Board of Trustees of NCCC does hereby consent and authorize the sale of the railroad easement property premises to the State of New York Department of Environmental Conservation, said transfer and sale being subject to the sanitary sewer easement rights of the Village of Saranac Lake and to the retained right of way easement rights of the County of Franklin and the County of Essex for the benefit of the North Country Community College; and that Steve Reed, Chairman of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized to sign and execute all documents necessary to the transfer of property pursuant to the resolutions. Mark Moeller seconded the motion. The motion was approved unanimously. (6-0-0)

Pete Suttmeier recommended resolution 2018/19 | 6 that the North Country Community College Board of Trustees hereby approves to adopt the changes to section 4c of the Bylaws that includes and specifically states "The Board of Trustees may also form ad hoc committees (i.e., audit, presidential search) and it is the determination of the Board of Trustees regarding the composition of these ad hoc committees including whether a Board of Trustees member or designees chairs an ad hoc committee". Anne McDonald seconded the motion. The motion was approved unanimously (6-0-0).

Academic Affairs North Country Community College VPAA Report to the College Senate February 8th, 2019

Greetings to you all and I hope you all enjoy the SL Winter Carnival! We have a number of our faculty and staff participating including in the Fun Run, Arctic Golf, the Lawn Chair Ladies, the Canoodlers, and on it goes. Please find updates from our area here:

Academic Planning, Programs and Policies:

• Academic Planning

- o Adult Students Quarter Course Proposals: We have been working with Alex and his team to explore several options for how to deliver programs that our adult students want in ways that they desire them the most. In general, these are being proposed as online quarter courses and have students taking classes in manageable chunks over the course of 18 months. This could not be conceived without several faculty members laying the groundwork over the years, experimenting in online and alternative scheduling of classes!
- o Transition to Blackboard: The transition continues, with ongoing training planned for the Spring 19 semester. We are also exploring some ideas on providing additional summer training. The adoption of a new learning platform is a major learning curve and we expect it will provide more opportunities to enhance instruction, both online and traditional, as well as streamline systems, allowing for course delivery and grade reporting to be on a singular system.
- o Campus Advisory Boards: We have tentatively scheduled these to occur at the following times. As happened last year, representatives from the campus community will be invited to participate as well.
 - Ticonderoga: Friday, March 8th from 9:00-11:00 am
 - Saranac Lake: Friday, March 15th from 9:00-11:00 am
 - Malone: Friday, April 5th from 9:00-11:00 am
- Ocontinuing Ed: SUNY released the Workforce Development Grant in late November. Since the start of this semester, Dave has been working with our WFD partners in Essex and Franklin Counties to explore training opportunities that can be funded through the grant. Dave is also exploring an opportunity with RealEstateCE.com a provider of online real estate continuing education to host a link to their trainings. They are licensed in NYS and the College would be reimbursed a % based on those that sign up through that unique URL. We are also anticipating another round of training with IP later in the semester.
- o St. Regis Mohawk Tribe: Over break, we heard from the Tribe's Education Department and are planning to meet with them over the next few weeks to review a higher education survey they conducted in Fall 18. All of this is related to how the College can support the higher education aspirations of tribal members including offering courses on Akwesasne.

Academic Programs:

- AA Lib Arts and Sciences Hum/Soc Science Teacher Ed Track the proposal has been approved by the Humanities and Social Science departments respectively and is working its way through our internal shared governance process.
- o Advanced EMT: We wrapped up and submitted the outstanding pieces required by NYSED including an agreement with Mountain Lakes EMS to run the Basic and Advanced EMT courses. We hope this is the last step in the approval process.
- AAS Nursing: Approved by SUNY in Spring 18 it remains at NYSED and Office for the Professions under review. Given our need to update course outlines and prepare for the Nursing Self-Study which takes place in late March, we opted to hold on sending the requested course outlines until they were updated. Those changes were approved by the

- Senate in December 18. Our plans are to resubmit prior to sending our Nursing Self-Study to NYSED.
- o AAS Entrepreneurship Mgmt Malone: Approved by SUNY on September 5th, 2018. It remains at NYSED under review.
- LPN and RN Self-Study: NYSED will visit the college in late March 2019 to review our LPN and RN programs for reaccreditation. The Nursing Department and many others across the College have been working on various portions of the self-study, which is due to NYSED in late February.
- O AAS Chemical Dependency Counseling: Changes to NYS regulations regarding Credentialed Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Counselors (CASACs) required an update of our program's content and, in some cases, course learning outcomes, to come into alignment with those regulations. Those changes were submitted approved by NYS OASAS in December 2018 and we continue to be a certified education and training provider to offer the 350-hour education program.
- SUNY Potsdam Proposal: No update to report.

• Middle States/Assessment of Student Learning:

- The faculty have continued to keep student learning assessment in the forefront of their departmental work, whether that be outcomes assessment, program review or engaging in assessment-related professional development
- We have five program reviews taking place this year: In addition to AAS Nursing, AAS Massage Therapy, AS Business: Sports and Events Mgmt, AS Environmental Science, and AS Health Science.
- Our Spring 19 Assessment Day included four (4) professional development sessions
 offered to the faculty on topics including the use of rubrics, including gamification in
 the class, fostering creative and constructive thinking and current research on the
 growth mindset.
- Over the next few weeks, we will be finalizing the self-study team and the design and reaching out to folks to ask them to join us in this critically important effort. While we would like nothing better than to invite everyone to participate, the self-study design is such that there are a limited number of committees and will not be able to ask you all. There will be opportunities for input from the campus community along the way...and there will be another self-study awaiting us eight years in the future ☺.
- College Bridge: Luke continues to make the transition in leading our College Bridge program.
 He has been completing spring registrations as well as working with guidance counselors and seniors at area high schools to show them how their College Bridge courses translate to degree requirements here and identify what they would need to take here to earn an associate's degree. Since December, Luke has visited nine high schools across Franklin and Essex Counties.

• Professional Development:

In addition to the Assessment Day workshops put on by Bruce Rowe, Selina LeMay-Klippel, Dave St. Germain and Sarah Maroun, we started the semester with a terrific presentation by Dr. Jeanne Tietjen on *Trauma-informed Learning and Teaching*. Many thanks to Kim I. for bring Jeanne to campus and our colleagues for presenting at Assessment Day.

• Academic Policies: No update to report.

- o P-TECH Programs Our P-TECH students continue with a presence at our Malone campus on weekday mornings. We expect that pattern to continue next year as well.
- o Perkins: No changes to report.




Vital Statistics

2) Middle States 2020-21 Self Study – Mission & Institutional Priorities – In January, I shared the need for the College to submit a self-study design to Middle States as a requirement we must meet prior to beginning our self-study. As I noted at opening remarks in January and the January meeting of the Board of Trustees, our MSCHE Institute attendees observed that we may need to revise our mission statement prior to submitting our proposed self-study design. On February 12th, we hosted an open forum to take up these questions. Below is the draft of revisions that emerged from that session with faculty and staff. We would like to finalize the institution's mission, vision and values statement by mid-March so that we can begin to assemble our self-study design proposal – which we believe we will complete by early June 2019. The MSCHE liaison would then visit the College in the Fall semester to discuss our design proposal.

Proposed Campus Closure Policy? — We certainly have had a rough run of winter weather that has resulted in a number of delayed start of classes and College closures. And without invoking a debate on the matter of climate change; it is evident that we are seeing an uptick in severe weather and the resultant poor road conditions. That fact has raised the likelihood that we will see a greater number of delayed starts, and College closures moving forward. If this observation holds true, do we need to revisit the "one campus closes, all three campuses close" practice? Over the years, we have discussed the current practice of college closures and delays. It is important to note here that the current action to close the college in weather or other related emergencies is based upon a "past practice" that was established between management and collective bargaining units. The past practice in question is "if one campus closes, the three sites close".

We have looked at proposed College closure policies that would allow the College to move away from this past practice. And although the discussions have been helpful with improving some of the ways in which we have approached closures and delays; the College has not been able to reach an agreement between all parties and so we have not adopted an official College closure policy. In February 2016, Diana Dudley and Joe Keegan drafted the last policy proposal reviewed by the College community. It was discussed in the Senate and with collective bargaining units. At the time, it did not move forward. Earlier this week, I forwarded to Sarah Kilby the 2016 proposed policy and in addition, I added in new campus sites we now

need to include in any proposed policy. Recent conversations around delayed start times has also put forward the proposal that the College consider the earliest we reopen under a delayed start condition is 11AM.

The administration welcomes the opportunity to revisit this proposed 2016 policy with our collective bargaining units later on in the semester. I want to thank Sarah Kilby for adding this item to the February Senate meeting and we look forward to the Senate's feedback on the revised proposal on a College closure policy. Once the administration has received the Senate's feedback, we will bring the current draft policy to both collective bargaining units and President's Council for more input and possibly some form of resolution.

- 4) College Discussion on Decision Related to Future Senior Enrollment Management Officer Position At the January meeting of the Board of Trustees, the decision was made to move forward with a search for a vice president for marketing and enrollment management. An RFP has been posted for search firms to submit proposals to assist with the VPM&E position. The proposals are due to the College by March 7th. We plan to advertise the position by no later than March 21st and recruit candidates and begin interviews in mid-April.
- 5) Pool Discussion In August, I shared with the faculty that we needed to assess the future status of our swimming pool. Equipment replacement costs coupled with low student usage called into question whether we could sustain operating the facility in the future. As the master planning process was also underway, we also needed to explore how could we use this space in the event we made a future decision to discontinue the pool facility. Again, as shared in earlier conversations, no decisions have been made on this matter. We continue to explore options!

Later in the fall semester, I communicated with the College community a list of pros and cons related to a potential pool closure. As noted then, there was no simply answers to the challenge before us. The Senate has also discussed this matter a few times as part of its deliberations. In January, Chris Knight prepared a survey for the greater local community to complete in regard to interest to support continued usage of the pool. Nearly 500 responses have been recorded. The Board of Trustees also heard from community members about the importance of the pool during their January 25th meeting. In addition, JMZ has identified an aquatics consultant to complete an assessment and to provide a clear estimate of what it would cost to fully rehab the pool. Finally, we are still hopeful that the YMCA discussion might yield the necessary financial support to staff a professional to in part, lead marketing and organize aquatics activities in this facility. So much is still being assessed and evaluated. JMZ will provide two estimates with their final draft of the Saranac Lake master plan in the weeks ahead; one with the costs to rehab the pool and place an addition on Sparks for other activities and one where these new activities are purposed in the current space occupied by the pool. Over the past month, I have continued to meet with local community advocates for rehabbing pool and their input has been fantastic. Our College is extremely appreciative of their support and we look forward to finding a win-win solution for all stakeholders involved. I do not know when we will arrive at a decision on this matter except to say that we will try to do so after we have collected all the information requested, developed a business plan and determined what is feasible to move forward with in the future.

6) Saranac Lake Master Plan – JMZ presented a preliminary draft of the proposed Saranac Lake Master Plan to the College's master planning committee in December. Representatives from Franklin County also attended this session. JMZ will be at NCCC to present the final draft on the afternoon of February 25th and immediately following the Board of Trustees meeting.

- 7) SUNY Canton SUNY Potsdam Update Current NCCC proposal to SUNY Canton and SUNY Potsdam will be reviewed by SUNY representatives and then forwarded to the two State operated institutions. Although a service area agreement proposal is still under consideration, given the time that NCCC is in the Spring 2019 semester, NCCC will look toward a potential Fall 2020 launch date. Again this launch date for this program is contingent on an approved service area agreement with SUNY Canton and an updated MOU authorized by SUNY stakeholders and SUNY central administration.
- 8) Smoking Ban Association's Residence Halls Property As you know, the College has been exploring a ban on smoking and tobacco use for the past year. Student Life and the NCCC Association have led this initiative. Recently, at the NCCC Association Board meeting, the Board voted to ban smoking and tobacco product on residence hall property. Currently, smoking is banned inside of the residence hall facilities. Beth Quinn, the executive director of the Association will request from the NCCC Board for Trustees to also approve a motion to ban smoking and tobacco products on residence hall property as part of her report to the Board at the February meeting.
